The 2020-21 New York State budget eliminates 340B drug discounts hospitals access for services provided to Medicaid enrollees.

Program Basics and Key Dates

The federal 340B Drug Pricing Program enables more than 100 New York safety net hospitals serving low-income and vulnerable New Yorkers to purchase outpatient drugs from pharmaceutical manufacturers at a discounted rate (~ 20% to 50% discount).

These hospitals rely on the savings from the 340B drug discount program to provide greater access to pharmaceuticals and comprehensive services in their communities, which they otherwise would not be able to do because of chronic underpayments from public payers like Medicaid.

340B Benefits for Patients

New York's 340B-eligible hospitals leverage savings accessed under 340B to operate programs and services that they might otherwise not be able to operate, such as the following services reported by HANYS' members:

- free or substantially discounted prescriptions to uninsured or low-income patients;
- medication therapy management programs to improve patient care and reduce overall healthcare costs and hospital readmissions;
- mobile units to bring care to rural and other medically under-served communities without local primary care options or pharmacies;
- free oncology services for low-income patients;
- multidisciplinary clinics offering substance abuse and mental health services; and
- transportation support for patients who need to use emergency room services.

These are just a few examples of the many ways NYS hospitals reinvest savings generated from the 340B program to improve access to care in vulnerable communities. Many of these investments come from hospitals that are financially vulnerable.

State Fiscal Year 2020-2021 Budget Actions

- October 1, 2020

Department of Health stakeholder workgroup to make recommendations on how to achieve Medicaid program savings for discounted drugs acquired by providers under the 340B program.

- No sooner than April 1, 2021

DOH to move the Medicaid pharmacy benefit from the managed care benefit package to the fee-for-service program (expected to reduce Medicaid spending by \$87.2 million). This change will have implications on the cost savings hospitals and other providers leverage from the 340B Drug Discount Program to reinvest in their communities.

April 1, 2023

Requires reimbursement of 340B drugs based on a method that considers the actual acquisition costs and professional dispensing fees.


