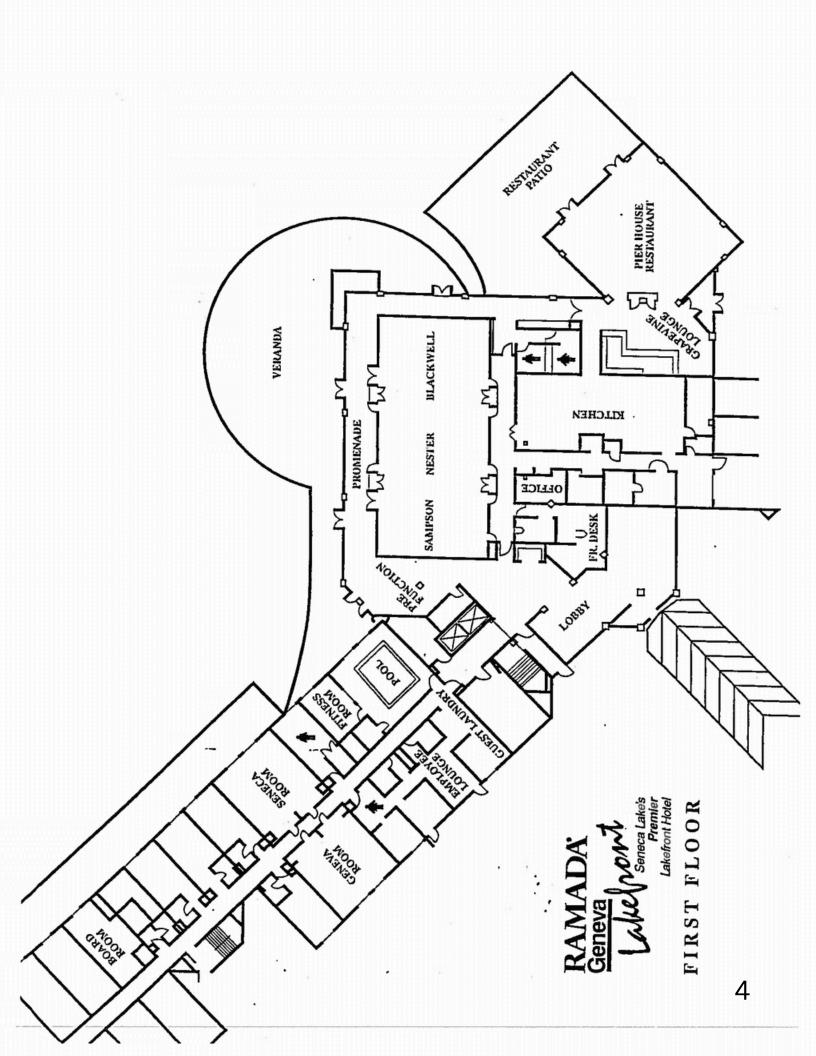

A graduate of the University of Bombay, he completed his residency and served as Chief Resident in Psychiatry at SUNY Upstate Medical Center. Dr. Dewan has held numerous leadership positions throughout his career, including Chair of the Department of Psychiatry from 1999 to 2011, and has been instrumental in medical education as the Director of the medical student clerkship and the residency training program.

Dr. Kaushal B. Nanavati was born in India and grew up in Rochester, New York. He has been a Rural Family Physician and has practiced in Central New York for over 29 years. He is currently the Assistant Dean of Wellness, Chair of Faculty Council, and Director of Integrative Medicine and Cancer Survivorship at SUNY Upstate Medical University. He has written a book series on Wellness titled, "CORE 4 of Wellness" and enjoys educating people on wellness, self-care, and achieving contentment and peace in life using humor, stories, and real, tangible examples.

Dr. Anna Kelles
Assembly District 125

Dr. Anna Kelles represents the 125th District, including Tompkins County and the majority of Cortland County. Assemblymember Kelles serves Assembly Committees on Environmental Conservation, Agriculture, Housing, Correction, Health, and Higher Education. She is the Chair of both the Commission on Rural Resources and the Subcommittee on Agricultural Production & Technology. She is a member of the Legislative Women's Caucus, the Task Force on Women's Issues and the Task Force on Food, Farm & Nutrition Policy.

Since taking office in 2021, Assemblymember Kelles has sponsored and passed legislation to protect public health, critical natural lands and underrepresented communities. She brought international attention to the environmental concerns of consolidated cryptocurrency mining using proof-of-work validation methods.



Dr. Rachel May
Senate District 48

Senator Rachel May represents Central New York's 48th District, including Syracuse and parts of Onondaga and Cayuga Counties. She chairs the Consumer Protection Committee and the Legislative Commission on Rural Resources.

Senator May has championed significant legislation, including election reforms, tenant-centered housing reforms, criminal justice reform, and ambitious climate initiatives. As Consumer Protection Committee chair, she advocates for the rights of consumers against corporate abuse and fraud.

Senator May had a successful career in higher education before running for public office, initially as a professor of Russian at Stony Brook University. After moving to Syracuse in 2001, she retrained in ecology, becoming the director of sustainability education at Syracuse University. She holds a master's from Oxford and a Ph.D. from Stanford, along with a master's from SUNY-ESF. She is currently serving her fourth term.

Past successes include coordinating a community-wide grant submission that awarded \$26.6M to the Finger Lakes region from the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Innovation as part of the Affordable Care Act Center for Innovation, facilitating a \$3.2M community-wide award to improve care transitions for high-risk Medicare beneficiaries, and designing a neighborhood-based health screening and education clinic.

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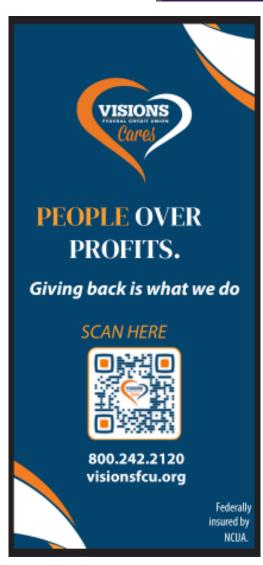
